# The Fallout That Wasn't: American Support for Ukraine Amid Political Shift

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#### **Key Findings**

- 1. Thoughts on the war: Americans across party lines share common understanding of the war and sympathy for Ukraine.
  - Americans are 20 times more likely to sympathize with Ukraine than Russia a sentiment echoed across France, Germany, Poland, and the UK. Republicans are more than 10 times as likely to sympathize with Ukraine.
  - 8 in 10 Americans say Putin is a dictator, and 6 in 10 believe Russia started the war.
- 2. Oval office fallout: Partisanship shapes views on the Feb. 28 White House meeting between President Trump and President Zelenskyy, but overall, Americans have grown more sympathetic to Ukraine since then.
  - Americans are twice as likely to have become more sympathetic (38%) to Ukraine than less sympathetic (18%), although
    the reaction differs by party.
  - Similarly, twice as many Americans (43%) say Trump and Vance were more disrespectful than Zelenskyy (22%).
  - Importantly, only 13% of Americans think the meeting meant that America should "stop helping Ukraine."
- 3. Commitment to Ukraine: A majority of Americans across parties remain firmly committed to supporting Ukraine.
  - Only a quarter of Americans think the US should stop supporting Ukraine now and only one fifth believe the US should engage in 1-1 peace talks with Russia without involving Ukraine.
  - Most Americans (67%), including a majority of Republicans (65%), believe that the US should keep sending aid to Ukraine until an end to the war has been established or negotiated. Nearly half support sending peacekeeping troops to Ukraine, a higher than than many other European allies.
- 4. An uncertain future: Most Americans remain skeptical of Russia's commitment to peace.
  - Less than one third of Americans (28%) think Russia would honor a ceasefire agreement.
  - 3 in 5 Americans think Russia will invade other parts of Europe in the coming years and are fearful of a coming war in Europe a concern shared by most across Europe.
  - While Americans still view Europeans as allies, the reverse is no longer true.



#### Methodology

More in Common conducted polling in the UK, Germany, France, and US.

- US polling: Fieldwork 2-5 March 2025, N = 1,965, representative of American adults
  - (English language online questionnaire)
- UK polling: Fieldwork 2-4 March 2025, N = 1,093, representative of GB adults
  - (English language online questionnaire)
- Germany polling: Fieldwork 3-5 March 2025, N = 1,513, representative of German adults
  - (German language online questionnaire)
- France polling: Fieldwork 4-5 March 2025, N = 1,503, representative of French adults
  - (French language online questionnaire)

Ibris conducted polling for More in Common in Poland.

- Poland polling: Fieldwork 3-5 March 2025, N = 1,000, representative of Polish adults
  - (Polish language mixed modes CATI/CAWI interviews)

Numbers in data visualizations are rounded to the nearest whole number. Figures may total to larger or smaller than one-hundred percent due to rounding.

In our analysis by political party affiliation, respondents who selected "Other" or "Not sure" were excluded from reporting and visualization due to small sample sizes.



#### The US public is 20 times more sympathetic to Ukraine than to Russia.


Which side do you sympathize with more in the conflict between Ukraine and Russia?





## American public's sympathy for Ukraine aligns with that of European countries.


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




### Americans are less polarized than many European countries on responsibility for the war.

## Americans are three times more convinced that Zelenskyy is responding well to the war than that Putin is.


How well or poorly do you think each of the following are responding to the war in Ukraine?






## Americans are twice as likely to think Trump was "most disrespectful in the Oval Office meeting" as Zelenskyy.








Thinking about events of the last week, including the meeting between Volodymir Zelenskyy and Donald Trump, how, if at all, have they changed your feelings about Ukraine?



- Don't know. President Zelensky was disrespectful. At this point, we should stop helping Ukraine.












#### Most Americans and Europeans want to support Ukraine until Russia is pushed back to least Ukraine's borders prior to 2022.






## A majority of Americans, including a majority of Republicans, support continued aid to Ukraine, as opposed to abandoning Ukraine altogether.

When it comes to US policy with regard to the war in Ukraine...


- The US should support Ukraine, sending it as much aid as it needs to defeat Russia on the battlefield.

- The US should stop supporting Ukraine, even if it means that Russia wins the war. The US has no interests in Ukraine, so should stay out of it.








If a peace treaty is agreed in Ukraine, to what extent would you support or oppose sending in US military personnel to act as peacekeepers?

If a peace treaty is agreed in Ukraine, to what extent would you support or oppose sending in [COUNTRY] military personnel to act as peacekeepers?






## Americans are three times more likely to think that if we "stopped supporting Ukraine" it would "weaken" rather than "strengthen" our standing in the world.



If there is a ceasefire how likely do you think it is that Russia will stick to it?









## Americans, like their European allies, worry about Russian aggression and the risk of war in Europe.

If Russia succeeds in capturing Ukrainian territory, how likely do you think that Russia will try to invade other European countries in the next few years?




How worried are you about the prospect of war in Europe in the next few years?






## 3 in 5 Americans think it's likely Russia will "try to invade other European countries in the next few years."


If Russia succeeds in capturing Ukrainian territory, how likely do you think that Russia will try to invade other European countries in the next few years?
